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Hospice The Nursing Perspective

Hospice provides services which may not be available in a nursing home, such as specialized knowledge of symptom management, and spiritual support for residents and families. Evidence suggests use of hospice can improve outcomes for nursing home residents (e.g., better pain management, less re-hospitalization, greater family satisfaction)⁸.

As opposed to direct medical intervention, hospice and palliative care focus on the comfort of the patient while providing compassionate attentiveness. Within the interdisciplinary hospice team, nurses play a vital role as they are charged with providing care on a regular basis and interact with patients and families regularly.

Orem's Theory in Practice. Hospice Nursing Care

Hospice care brings together a team of people with special skills—among them nurses, doctors, social workers, spiritual advisors, and trained volunteers.
